Lacerations and other acute wounds are an important subset of acute injuries with approximately 9 million seen yearly in US Emergency Departments alone (20). These wounds require appropriate physical evaluation for extent of injury, radiographic evaluation for secondary injury, and irrigation/exploration for cleansing and foreign body and debris removal.

Lacerations & Wound Care Lacerations are cuts or open wounds. All cuts need first aid, but some lacerations may also need medical treatment.

Lacerations Wound Care in Urgent Care

To care for a wound: Keep the wound and the surrounding area clean and dry at all times. Remove any crusting, and clean the area with mild soap and water. Apply a thin layer of antibiotic ointment to facial lacerations only.

Cleanse the wound periphery with soap and sterile water or available solutions, and provide anesthetics and analgesia whenever possible. Irrigate wounds with saline solution using a large bore needle and syringe. If unavailable, bottled water is acceptable. Leave contaminated wounds, bites, and punctures open.

Wounds that are minor usually heal with first aid and home treatment. Moderate to severe wounds and lacerations may need stitches, medical treatment, or antibiotics to avoid complications like infections. Healing time for wounds, cuts, and lacerations depend on the type and severity of the injury.

Wound Care: Antibiotics, Treatment & Healing Time

Take Care of Wounds Wash your hands thoroughly with soap and clean water, if possible. Avoid touching the wound with your fingers while treating it (if possible, use disposable, latex gloves). Remove obstructive jewelry and clothing from the injured body part.
